Providing unbiased, emotional support and resources by trained Parent Guides to families with children who are deaf/hard of hearing (d/hh).



Parent-to-parent support allows families to:

- · Learn about the needs of a child who is d/hh
- Have a safe place to process and act on information
- Hear about resources in a supportive environment

In addition, the guidance and friendship of another parent who has experienced similar emotions, events and responsibilities often allows families to feel more at ease; coming to an understanding that everything is going to be okay.

The IL Hands & Voices Guide By Your Side (ILHV GBYS) program works one-on-one with families, matching a trained Parent Guide with each family. The Parent Guide speaks with the family to discuss concerns, needs and share knowledge gained from their personal journey of raising a child who is d/hh.

The IL H&V GBYS and Early Hearing Detection & Intervention (EHDI) programs partnered to recognize those in the field who are making an impact within the EHDI goals of 1-3-6.



These goals ensure babies have their hearing screened by 1 month of age, receive a diagnostic hearing evaluation no later than 3 months of age and that all infants with hearing loss enroll in Early Intervention no later than 6 months of age.

In 2023, we had the pleasure of recognizing Tracy Meehan, Maribeth Lartz, Kelley Hemesath, Maira Nava and the HiTrack team facilitated by James Fritzler for their ability to create change and improvement within these benchmarks.





Parent Achievement Award



We provide outreach and education to providers who serve families with children who are DHH.

The 59th Annual Illinois Teachers of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing (ITDHH) Conference, The One Where We Collaborate, took place in early March. The main purpose of ITDHH is to provide information and support to teachers and other organizations related to the field of Deafness. Topics included implicit bias, audiograms, cochlear implant and hearing aid accessories, and augmented communication. The conference was hybrid, held in person with recorded presentations. THE JOYS OF RAISING DEAF OR HARD OF HEARING CHILDREN

Family Tip Sheet



Fostering Joy is a family/professional effort celebrating the joy of raising a child who is deaf or hard of hearing (D/HH). Fostering Joy provides resources for families and professionals to support the growth and development of a child who is D/HH.

Loving and supportive families provide a strong base for social and emotional health and well-being. Focusing on special moments that bring joy helps families put aside concerns and focus on their natural and loving parent-child connections.

Taking short breaks from the stresses of everyday life helps families explore and appreciate the joyful moments that come with raising their children. Here are a few tips, offered by families, for finding joy everyday - taking time to celebrate milestones, connecting with your children, and letting the lights of their love shine through.

TIPS

- Find something to be grateful for everyday.
- Carve out a few minutes each day to breathe deeply, enjoy a laugh, and snuggle closely with your child.
- See the world through your child's eyes notice the wonder, excitement, and love!
- Share something with your child that made you smile, felt like a success, and renewed your hope.
- Seek balance and refreshment: take a walk together in nature, do "baby yoga", or read a fun book together.
- Connect an appointment or therapy session with a treat or adventure.
- Trust that making space to foster joy will lead to increased learning and deeper connections for you and your child.
- Document your family's journey together through pictures, video, social media, or journaling. (A few short sentences will do!)
- Take time regularly to revisit your child's and family's history and reflect on just how far you've come.
- Set aside your "to do" list and do something you love with your child - take a walk, blow bubbles, cook together, play peek-a-boo, dance.
- Appreciate yourself and all you are doing to support and advocate for your child!



Parent Tip Sheet Early Literacy Development

iteracy is the ability to read and write. You can help your child develop the skills he or she needs for later reading when reading storybooks, interacting with print, and associating sounds/fingerspelling in his or her environment. Building these skills early will help your child start school ready to learn to read!

Long before your child is taught to read in school, he or she starts developing the skills necessary for later reading. For your child to eventually read, strong language skills, basic knowledge about print, and an awareness of how words are made up of sounds/fingerspelled letters are needed.

There are many ways that literacy development in Deaf or Hard of Hearing (D/HH) children is similar to that in hearing children. However, D/HH children may be at a higher risk for experiencing delays or having greater difficulty learning to read. Here are some activities you can use with your child to promote early literacy development!





- ✓ Share books as early and as often as you can.
- ✓ Tell stories and invite your child to tell you stories. Example: "What happened at school today?" Start with a shared experience to help develop storytelling.
- ✓ Point out signs, e.g., McDonald's. Play games identifying the signs that you see. This is really early reading!
- ✓ In your community, look for signs that are familiar to your child. Point out the letters and words you see on the signs.
- Associate sounds/fingerspelling with letters as early as possible.
- ✓ Label everything in your home with words, pictures and/or signs.
- Play games with words starting or ending with a certain sound or fingerspelled letter.
- ✓ Sing songs and teach nursery rhymes to your child.
- ✓ Look at your child while reading, make sure the child sees the signing, the words and the pictures.
- ✓ Play games where you connect a picture/visual with a word.



IS THIS FOR YOU?

As part of tasks related to our grant funding for ILHV GBYS, we have started a quality improvement (QI) project by establishing parent workgroups. Our first QI workgroup consisted of five parents, our GBYS program coordinator, and a Parent Guide. This group met monthly during the first quarter of the year. For each meeting, the parents were assigned documents used in the GBYS program to review and provide honest feedback on. We received great, thoughtful feedback on the documents, including everything from the design to the content to the links provided for additional information. Our goal for creating each parent group is for it to be made up of parents with a variety of diverse cultural, geographic, linguistic, etc. backgrounds as well as those with children of various ages and type/level of hearing differences.

We plan to continue this QI project and are looking for parents who are willing to participate. The monthly time commitment is 1.5 hours of material review and 1.5 hours on Zoom sharing feedback, and parents are paid for this time. Groups typically meet once a month for three months on Thursday evenings, but can shift based on the group members' common availability. If you are interested, please use the QR code above to apply.

We are looking to host two specific QI sessions this year. For these meetings, we are seeking participants who are African American/Black and Latinx/Mexican to provide recommendations and brainstorm with us how we can reach and support more families within these specific communities.



June 25, 2023 to July 1, 2023: For Low Vision/Blind-HoH/Deaf Youth 7-17yrs Camp Red Leaf (formerly known as Henry Horner) Ingleside, It. Offers canoeing, archery, nature, crafts, cookouts around the fire, a dance and so much fun it's hard to imagine. Top it off with a pool party and camp talent show and you have it all!

July 2, 2023 to July 8, 2023: For Low-Vision/Blind-HoH/Deaf Adults 18 & older Camp Red Leaf (formerly known as Henry Horner) Ingleside, IL at Camp Helen Keller: Eligible adults have the opportunity to relax and participate in activities in the great outdoors while still being in an accessible environment. Camp Lions Helen Keller is a great place to meet other individuals with similar life experiences. Activities at Camp Lions Helen Keller are geared to adult participants. They include swimming, team sports, card and board games, arts and crafts, a talent show, even a dance. Fun activities make this an active camp!

Our daily schedules, which are posted in large print and in braille, may list some of the following choices: swimming, beeper baseball, beeper archery, and crafts such as painting, beading, or small handmade items. Every day is different and perfect for the creative spirit. A beach party, dance, talent show, cookouts, songs around the campfire, pool swims, braille bingo & cards, plus a wide assort- ment of tactile games, described videos, and more will fill this week with fun! Every cabin is one level and has a modern bathroom with a walk-in shower. Our counselor to camper ratio is 1:4 to make Camp Lions a positive and safe experience.

July 30, 2023 to August 5, 2023: For Low Vision/Blind-HoH/Deaf Youth 7-17yrs Camp DuBois Center DuBois, IL At this campsite there are many activities to do, such as, water sports, fishing, teams courses, ga-ga ball, basketball, beeper baseball, archery, horseback riding, swimming, boating, water mat, arts & crafts, cookouts with s' mores and talent night to top it off! Plus time to relax and talk with new friends under the shade of a tree.
