CIAF Gives the Gift of Hearing to Romania

Cochlear implant technology has dramatically changed the lives of hearing impaired individuals not only in the United States, but throughout the world. Established in 2005, the Cochlear Implant Awareness Foundation (CIAF) has been providing cochlear implant (CI) equipment to qualified applicants in need through its Hear Again[™] program. CIAF is the only organization in the world doing what we do.



This Fall, the news of our work reached an incredible organization in Romania

called the Romanian Hearing Project of International Teams lead by Dr. Tricia Towle. Dr. Towle left her home and medical practice in Pennsylvania in 2003 to go to Cluj, Romania to help hearing impaired individuals. In 2010, Dr. Towle became an advocate for deaf children to receive cochlear implants provided for by the Romanian Health Ministry. Her first patient is now 15 years old and has exceeded all expectations with speech and language. The cochlear implants are helping children thrive in Romania!

Dr. Towle's advocacy for children in the Eastern bloc extended into Albania this past summer where she met a girl named Armela. Armela and her brother Arjeni are both deaf and their family is very poor. While Arjeni received a cochlear implant at age 2, Armela was denied at age 5 because the Armenian government said she was "too old" but more likely because she was a female. Armela's mother was not dissuaded in finding help for her daughter and was put into contact with Dr. Towle through a mutual missionary friend. Dr. Towles contacted the Albanian government regarding the Albanian Health Ministry's decision but after tireless months of inquiry, there was no move forward. Undeterred, Dr. Towles told Armela's story to countless people in the United States as well as Romania. In September, Dr. Towle received an email from an American doctor who has a medical foundation in Albania and wanted to contribute a large sum to Armela's implant. Other donors from Romania stepped forward to pay the remaining sum and by the end of October, Armela would have her surgery in Romania. Such a miracle for this 8-year-old girl and her family!

Romania is a very poor country, but by comparison, has more resources than Albania. A government program does exist within Romania for children to receive cochlear implants however support for updating equipment is very poor. In most countries, the processors are replaced every five years, but some children in Romania have used theirs for more than 12 years! There is a dire need for cochlear implant equipment in Romania. CIAF corresponded with Dr. Towle and the Vice President of Asculta Viata (Hear Life) Cosmin Brasov in Roma-

nia to better understand what cochlear implant equipment was needed to make the biggest impact within the hearing impaired community. CIAF puts forth countless hours every year to ensure all our CI equipment is efficiently cataloged and documented. It is for this reason in October we were able to send a comprehensive donation of \$564,00 worth of CI equipment to Romania! We are confident Dr. Towle and her staff will deliver this equipment to those most in need and help more children with similar stories to that of sweet Armela. Summer Internship at Eli Lilly in Indianapolis

I recently finished my 3rd year at Butler University in Indianapolis. I'll be graduating next spring with a Degree in Health Care and Business. My last 2 summers and this past semester I had an internship at Eskenazi Hospital in Indianapolis. During my time at Eskenazi I was able to network within the tight work community. Through my connections I was introduced to an individual in senior management, who then became a mentor and colleague. How WE HELP

The University of Illinois at Chicago - Division of Specialized Care for Children offers free care coordination for families of children with special health care needs in Illinois.

Care Coordinators tailor services to each family's needs. Our support may include:

- assistance accessing free diagnostic testing;
- finding specialized medical care;
- help utilizing insurance;
- finding resources and information;



- developing a plan of care;
- communicating with doctors, specialists, and schools; and
- preparing for transition.

Free care coordination is available if your child has, or is suspected of having, a treatable chronic condition in one of the following categories:

- 💿 Cardiac Impairments
- 💿 Cystic Fibrosis
- 💿 Eye Impairments (Cataract, Glaucoma, Strabismus)
- External Body Impairments (Cleft Lip and Palate, Craniofacial Anomalies)
- 💿 Hearing Impairments
- 💿 Hemophilia
- Inborn Errors of Metabolism (Phenylketonuria [PKU])
- Nervous System Impairments (Seizures, Nerve, Brain, Spinal Cord)
- Orthopedic Impairments
- Speech Impairments (Dysarthria, Vocal Cord Paralysis)
- Orinary System Impairments

You may also qualify for financial assistance for the health care needs of your child.

How It Works

Parents submit an application to be a part of the CP. The CP coordinator works directly with the family to arrange mentor services. Mentors then visit families, typically two hours per week, in their homes where their child is most comfortable and eager to learn. They are selected to represent the CP for the ease of their communication style with family members and for their comfortable approach with children.

HELP MAKE HEALTH CARE BETTER FOR WOMEN WHO ARE DEAF OR HARD OF HEARING (DHH)

If you are a Deaf or Hard of Hearing (DHH) woman who has given birth in the last 5 years, we want to talk to you! Sometimes people who are DHH aren't treated the same as other people at the doctor, especially if they are pregnant. We want to make health care better for these women. We need help from mothers who are DHH.

Who Is Elligble?

- You must be 21 years or older
- We will ask you questions about what it was like when you were pregnant and had your baby. It takes about 60-90 minutes to be interviewed. You would get \$50 as a thank you. Remember, it's ALWAYS your choice to be involved in research. You don't have to do it.

Research Opportunity for Children with Hearing Loss

WHO: Children between 5 and 12 years of age with hearing loss who use hearing aids or cochlear implants

WHAT does the study involve?

- Online surveys about your child's language and development
 - Compensation for surveys: \$20
- *Optional:* one day-long home recording where your child wears an audio recording device designed for child language research.
 - Compensation for survey & recording: \$55

The lab would arrange for pickup and drop off of the recorder and vest and would not be present for the day of recording. Children who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing who can hear at a conversational volume with language technology (i.e. Cls, HAs)



WHAT does the study involve?

- Online surveys about your child's language and development
 - Compensation for surveys: \$20
- *Optional :* one 45-minute visit to the Bergelson Lab on Duke's West Campus for an eye-tracking study on spoken word understanding
 - Compensation for survey and lab visit: \$40

The lab provides free parking during your visit and can provide babysitting for siblings during the brief eyetracking study.

WHY should you participate?

This study will help researchers understand more about how infants and toddlers with sensory impairments learn language.

All children will receive a commemorative gift for their participation.
