Journey of my Dreams

Many of us on our parenting journey didn't have all the information and tools at our fingertips when we started our path raising children who are deaf and hard of hearing. But somehow and at some point we found our way, made connections, found assistance and support and then may of even felt drawn to serve others who were embarking down the same road. I know for me that was a key driving point for leading our state Guide By Your Side (GBYS) program.

When our state was considering parent to parent support you can bet I made time for those meetings and gave my suggestions because I was determined to see the program embark and succeed. So, naturally when the conversation led to the two options of do we invest in a national model or create our own I pushed for them to pursue in investing in the Hands & Voices GBYS program. Here we are celebrating our ten-year anniversary this past year and I am so proud of our program and thankful for those that helped make this program a reality for Illinois.

The national GBYS program continues to grow and strengthen numerous leaders by offering ongoing educational opportunities, connections via social media, resources within the national website, technical assistance points of contact, a "Guide's Guide" manual, the ability for leaders to come together to share success and work through challenges and the capacity for programs to request from

each other resources or materials to unique situations or specific languages. These are

some of the many perks of being connected to a national model. We don't have to reinvent the wheel! Instead we can collaborate, learn and grow together. I am so grateful for the leaders I get to share this journey with.

Over the past 10 years our IL GBYS program has developed over 40 guides, served over 750 families, participated in over 100 team trainings and provided over 300 outreach opportunities all while being an "opt in" program. Meaning we don't receive referrals directly from any one point of contact from the state. We worked hard to get our name out, provide events and make connections so that others

Filling a need

My daughter, Rebekah, has unilateral microtia-atresia, a condition where her left ear did not fully develop in utero. Her ear canal is closed, making her deaf in one ear. She wears a BAHA (bone anchored hearing aid), a hearing aid that helps her hear better. In our journey with microtia, I've discovered a need for a well-designed children's book to help hard of hearing children navigate the unique challenges they face. In preparation for Rebekah starting preschool this fall, I created a customized book to help her gain tools in self-



advocacy for the use of her device and to feel empowered in the midst of her differences. Several months ago we started calling her BA-HA a superpower and it has had a huge impact on the excitement and self-image that she has around her device. When we turn it on, Rebek-



ah proclaims proudly "Superpowers ignite!" We also know that kids will inevitably have questions, and this resource gives the skills to help navigate those conversations. Rebekah now knows that the questions are going to come and how to address them in a confident way. We launched a kickstarter to help cover the initial costs of the book and making it possible for oth-

er kiddos to get the book. Because of the kickstarter we were able to donate 30 books to Lurie's Children's Audiology Department to distribute to other kiddos with microtia, as well as one for each of Rebekah's classmates for her first 4 years of school. The book is now available for purchase on lulu.com (link below). I also have the dream of creating a version featuring a kiddo with a Cochlear implant and behind the ear hearing aid.

More About Institute

What do children do? Each morning the children go to classrooms overseen by experienced teachers of children who are deaf or hard of hearing. Children receive hearing, vision, psychological, speech, language and educational evaluations. Children will also have the chance to play with other children who have a hearing loss.

What do parents do? Parents attend daily lectures by experts in the field to learn about raising a child with hearing loss. They also meet in small groups to discuss specific concerns and connect with other caregivers. Parents meet with professional staff to review the evaluations for their child. They also have the opportunity to learn about various communication modes used with deaf or hard of hearing individuals.

Lecture topics include:

- Child Development
- Types of Hearing Loss
- Communication Choices
- Hearing Aids, Cochlear Implants
- Language Development
- Parent Rights
- School Programming
- Deaf Culture

What about siblings? Brothers and sisters, through age 12, can come to the Institute. They participate in activities for their age group at the Nursery School on the ISD campus. Siblings also stay with their families in the dorms and go to recreational activities.

What does it cost? There is no cost for families who come to the Institute. Meals and housing are provided at no charge on the campus of the Illinois School for the Deaf. This week is free!

Who works at the Institute? Professionals from all over Illinois come to the Institute. They come from hospitals, schools, colleges, private centers, ISD, DSCC and DPH.

Where is the Institute? The Institute is held at the Illinois School for the Deaf in Jacksonville, Illinois. Jacksonville is 30 miles west of Springfield on Interstate 72.

Child's Voice is a listening and spoken language program for infants and toddlers with hearing loss and their families.

Teletherapy Services

What is teletherapy?

- Speech and aural rehabilitation therapies provided through an internet connection using a smart phone, tablet or computer with a camera.
- Therapy sessions where parents and caregivers play an active role and learn how to develop their child's communication skills through daily routines and resources found in their homes.







Who provides the services?

Speech-language pathologists and developmental therapists - hearing specialists who are EI credentialed providers in the state of Illinois.

Who is teletherapy for?

- Families who have a baby or toddler with hearing loss and want their child to learn to listen and talk.
- Families who do not have access to an early intervention provider who specializes in listening and spoken language.

These services are free.







Our care coordination makes it possible for families to:

- Feel more confident and organized in the care of their child.
- Understand and stay at the center of decisions about their child's care.

- Effectively navigate the maze of resources and insurance coverage/ benefits.
- Support and achieve their child's educational and vocational goals.

SPECIALIZED CARE FOR CHILDREN

How WE HELP

The University of Illinois at Chicago's Division of Specialized Care for Children (DSCC) partners with Illinois families and communities to help children and youth with special health-care needs connect to services and resources. We guide families through their child's journey with a medical condition and work with doctors, schools and community groups to create a seamless support system. We assess a child's medical, social, behavioral, educational and financial needs and develop a personalized plan of care. This process is called care coordination and is **FREE**, regardless of a family's income level.

Our care coordination is tailored to each family and focused on their specific goals. It can include:

- Accessing diagnostic testing
- · Finding specialized medical care
- Helping families maximize their insurance and understand their coverage/benefits
- · Communicating with doctors and specialists
- Attending school meetings and assisting with the IEP or 504 Plan process
- Coordinating transportation for appointments
- Applying for grants to fund therapies, equipment or other needs
- Linking families with local charities, programs and resources
- Facilitating equipment orders
- Assisting with the application for federal and state benefit programs, such as SSI, Illinois Link Card and WIC
- Connecting families for parent-to-parent support
- Preparing for the transition to adulthood

Financial Assistance Available - We can also help pay for eligible medical expenses, such as equipment, therapies, supplies and medical services, when families meet income guidelines.

WHO WE SERVE

DSCC serves Illinois families with children up to age 21 who have or are suspected of having an eligible medical condition. Eligible conditions include, but are not limited to:

- Blood Disorders
- · Cardiovascular Impairments
- Craniofacial & External Body Impairments
- Eye Impairments
- · Gastrointestinal Impairments
- · Hearing Impairments
- Inborn Errors of Metabolism
- Nervous System Impairments
- · Orthopedic Impairments
- Pulmonary Impairments
- Urogenital Impairments

We also serve families who care for children and youth who require in-home shift nursing through the Home Care Program. DSCC operates the Home Care Program on behalf of the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS). This program helps youth remain in their family home rather than a hospital or skilled nursing facility. Many eligible youth are also medically fragile and dependent on technology - such as on ventilators, tracheostomies and gastrostomy tubes - for their well-being.


